The next meeting is February 3, 2018, at 11:30 a.m. The Red Robin on Winchester Street in

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
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Murray will be our place to gather. The weather will determine if there will be a drive following the meeting.


of the restaurant.

They are famous for the stainless steel, aluminum-bodied or "chrome-looking" Cobras. They will custom-make any kind of Cobra that you want, and they are all high perfor-



mance vehicles. They specialize in the 427's and 289's. They have built over 800 replica Cobras since 1994. We went to visit their company 10 years ago – in March, 2008. This Miata adventure explores western Canada via Mount Rainer National Park in the state of Washington. The United States will be left via ferry from Port Angeles, Washington, to Victoria, British Columbia. The adventure will continue to the northern end of Vancouver Island to Port Hardy, British Columbia. A second ferry ride of 318 miles will begin from Port Hardy through the inside passage to Prince Rupert, British Columbia. From Prince Rupert, the adventure will wind its way back to the United States at Grand Forks, British Columbia, at the Washington State border.

Total estimated driving miles: 3,276

Total ferryboat miles: 340

This trip does require a current passport.

## **Anniversary Pins Presentation**by Mike Bailey

For the last two years at the Election & Planning meeting, we have passed out members' Anniversary Pins to Club members to honor them for their membership in the Utah Miata Club. For those who are new to the Club, we give out a pin on the annual anniversary of your membership for 3, 5, 10, 15, 20 and 25 years. We started this program in 2015. The first year, we gave them out on the month of the member's anniversary, but it got to be too much work to keep track. So we started giving them out at the Planning meeting each year in January for all anniversaries during that year, regardless of the month in which your anniversary falls. You get your pin in advance!



The pins were quite economical to produce, as we used the same mold for all 6 pins – but change the anniversary year on each one and the color of the metal. We mixed and matched the different metals for a striking-looking pin.

The six pins incorporate 9 different metal combinations with 4 Pantone pigment ink colors and are made with hard enamel.

The metals are as follows: **3 Years** – white back on bright copper metal; **5 Years** – white back on bright silver metal; **10 Years** – recessed gold on bright gold metal; **15 Years** – recessed black nickel on antiqued copper metal; **20 Years** – recessed silver on bright silver metal; and **25 Years** – recessed black nickel on black nickel metal. The Miata script logotype for the Club is in bright red, the circles on the logo are raised black, and the year numbers are etched black.

I want to mention some major anniversaries of some of our Club members. Jim and Dorothy Bowers have been members for 27 years. They have lived in Hawaii for many years and have a daily driver Miata there, as well as a Miata in Utah when they come here to visit. They are the longest-running active members of the Club. Next is Paul and Annie Kloer with 26 years, with their Black, first generation NA Miata with red seats. They live in Murray, Utah. Spence Wood, who has owned Silver and Galaxy Grey Miatas, lives in Riverton, Utah, and has been a member for 23 years. Steve Tobiasson and

Ron Steckler, with 23 years, have a very nice, wellmaintained, Black NA Miata. Mike and Lynn Bailey, with two NB Miatas – an '02 Blazing Yellow and an '05 MazdaSpeed, both SE's - live in Riverton and have been in the club for 21 Years. Other members with 21 years are David and Ana Porter from Queen's Creek, Arizona, who have had more different Miatas over the years than you can count on both hands, with as many as 5 at the same time. With 20 Years, Annette Neilsen from Murray, Utah, has had both a White and Red NA. Mark and Charisse Ferguson, with 20 Years, are from Salt Lake City, Utah, and have a Red NA Miata. Also with 20 Years, Joye Carlson and her late husband, Kent, from Mesa, Arizona, owned a 1992 Sunburst Yellow NA Miata. With 18 Years; Jeff and Deb Moon of Sandy, Utah, own a Velocity Red MazdaSpeed, a very beautiful Miata. With 15 Years, Dick and Judy Dyson owned a Crystal Blue 2002 NB and now have a NC Copper Red Miata and live in North Salt Lake, Utah. (They can tell you how to survive a major crash in a Miata!) And last, but not least, is Scotty Medine who has worked at Bountiful Mazda for many year and has been with the Club over 15 years.

Just to note, we passed a resolution at the Planning meeting to initiate the "Honorary" member status, given to all who have reached 20 years as members of the Club. After 20 years, you will be considered a

"Lifetime UMC Member" and will not have to pay dues in future years unless you choose to do so. We think this is a wonderful way of honoring all long-standing members of the Club. We plan to incorporate this into the Club's By-Laws the next time they are changed and ratified.

If you were not at the Planning meeting, be sure to contact me at one of the luncheons or meetings this year for your pin. I will be keeping an eye out for you as well. It is just a way that the Club honors our members for their years of participation. I don't know of any other Miata clubs who have this program. I know at some regional and national events, people have asked me what the anniversary pins are about, especially when we do "pin trading". They want to purchase one, but I tell them they are not for sale and are only for our Club's members.
